



Special Education Process Guide: Reevaluation

Meeting Overview:

- The Individualized Education Program (IEP) team will:
 - Discuss what is known about your child from school records. This could include attendance, work samples, local/state assessment data, medical/health information, discipline reports, and progress on IEP goals.
 - Discuss any evaluations or reports that you have shared.
 - Discuss the results of current classroom assessments. This could include unit tests, common grade-level tests, etc.
 - Discuss observations from school staff related to your child's performance in school. This could include both academic (i.e. math, reading, etc) and non-academic activities (i.e. lunch, recess, etc.) and/or information from others who have knowledge of your child.
 - Discuss any other information reviewed from other sources (i.e. information related to virtual instruction or suspensions, etc.)
- Then, the team will determine whether additional data (if any) are needed.

Evaluations & information provided by the parent...

- Do you have any information that would help us understand your child's needs? It is helpful if you can share that information with the rest of the IEP team.
- As the teachers talk about school, you can share what you are seeing at home related to homework, comments about school, etc.
- Provide any outside evaluations ahead of the meeting if at all possible.
