









# Definition

 "offers North Carolina students the opportunity to personalize and accelerate their learning by earning course credit through a demonstration of mastery of course material" (from NCDPI Guide)

# Background

 NC Board of Education required all local school districts to create a process (Policy GCS-M-001.8)



- Similar to Single Subject Acceleration (SSA)
  - Both provide acceleration through the student showing mastery without direct instruction
  - Qualification for both requires successful completion of an objective (multiple choice assessment)

- Different from (SSA)
  - SSA applies to elementary and middle school course content. CDM applies only to courses that have high school credit.
  - Scores required to move forward are much higher in CDM than SSA.
  - Students can earn a credit toward graduation with CDM.
  - CDM applies to more than just ELA and Math courses.
  - CDM is a two-phase process that requires a skills application assessment.



## **Two-Phase Process**


- Phase I Examination of Foundational Skills: Minimum Scores
  - EOC: Level V
  - CTE Post-Assessment: 90%
  - Locally Developed Exam: 90%
  - World Language Proficiency Assessment: Novice High (for two WL credits)
- Phase II Product or Application of Skills Assessment
  - Most require an additional assessment session
  - Reviewed by school-based/central office panel







#### **Student Expresses Interest in the CDM Process**

Students will express interest formally by completing the Application for Credit by Demonstrated Mastery document and returning it to the CDM contact within their school. This typically happens in September and October. Specific dates can be found on the <a href="CDM website">CDM website</a>.

#### **Academic Counseling Process**

It is important that each student understands the CDM process and its implications for their four-year plan, transcript, grade point average, and class rank. Each student is expected to meet with their counselor to discuss these items. This typically happens in November - January based on testing schedule.

#### Phase 1 Assessment

Phase 1 is an assessment of foundational understanding of the concepts and standards for the course. This is a multiple choice assessment. The Phase 1 assessment occurs during the last 5 days of first semester. Students are notified of their results January-February based on testing schedule.

#### Student Does Not Show Proficiency in Phase 1

When a student does not show proficiency at the Phase 1 level, the process ends. No credit is earned. There is no notation of this attempt on the student's transcript.

#### Student Shows Proficiency on Phase 1

When a student does meet the required proficiency on Phase 1, they will be given information related to the Phase 2 assessment process.

#### Phase 2 Assessment

Phase 2 assessments can take many forms depending on the course and its standards. Student action to submit artifacts and/or complete a task is typically completed by the end of March and then be assessed by a district CDM Review Panel. Results will be shared in April.

#### Student Does Not Show Proficiency in Phase 2

No credit is earned. There is no notation of this attempt on the student's transcript.

## Student Does Show Proficiency in Phase 2

Credit will be recorded on the transcript by the school. Grade will be marked as CDM.

- Phase I Assessments -

    - Level V (minimum score)
  - Locally developed English I, Math 2
    - 90% (minimum score)

- Must be in the 8th grade or higher
- Utilizes Avant STAMP 4S proficiency assessment (measures what a student can do with a language outside of a classroom setting)
- Not specific to any level (not a placement test)
- Novice High minimum to receive a maximum of 2 World Language credits

| Can middle school students (6th-8th<br>grades) get high school credit?   | Yes. If they successfully complete Phase 1 and Phase 2 in a course for high school credit, they will get high school credit and their transcript will say "Pass."   |  |
| Do all colleges accept CDM?  | UNC system schools will recognize CDM. Private colleges/universities have not made such a statement, nor have universities in other states.   |  |
| Are the schools equipped to meet the scheduling needs for students who are successful with CDM? For example, what about a student who successfully completes CDM for Math 2 and needs to take Math 3 in middle school? | Course options vary by school. Prior to applying for this process, students should speak to the school counselor to determine course options. In middle school, NCVP5 might be the only option.   |  |
| Are there a maximum number of courses a student can apply for CDM per year?  | Students can apply for up to three total courses per year and only one course per content area per year. For example, a student cannot apply for English I and English II in the same year. The exception would be for World Language credit being earned through NCDPI approved external assessments (see FAQs below).   |  |
| Will there be rigorous courses available if students are successful in earning CDM?  | Course offerings vary by school. Prior to applying for this process, students should speak to the school counselor to determine course options.   |  |
| Where should we turn in the Student and Family Application?  | Turn it in to the Student Services office at your school or to the school's CDM Coordinator.  |  |
| Is this available only to AG students?   | No, it is available to any secondary student.   |  |
| Are there benefits to seniors applying for this now?   | No. Students that will graduate during this school year are not eligible to apply.  |  |
| For courses taught in a predetermined<br>sequence, is CDM only applicable for the<br>next course in the sequence?  | Yes. You must complete the courses (either through seat time or CDM) by using the prescribed sequence (if a sequence exists).   |  |

| Where will we find resources for preparing for the assessments?  | Students should only apply for this process if they are already proficient in the course content; students should not need help sessions or outside tutoring. #### World Language Credit by Demonstrated Mastery Process

Credit by Demonstrated Mastery (CDM) is the process by which a student may earn credit for a high school course by demonstrating a deep understanding of the content; without course enrollment or seat time. CDM offers students the opportunity to personalize and accelerate their learning, thus allowing for optimal student growth while providing an opportunity to have effective seat time to learn new content.

WCPSS Languages Offered in the High School Program Planning Guide WCPSS offers Credit by Demonstrated Mastery in the languages offered in the High School Program Planning Guide (French, German, and Spanish). Additional information can be found on the WCPSS CDM Webpage.

Languages Not Offered in the High School Program Planning Guide For languages not offered in the High School Program Planning guide, CDM is available for languages included on the NCDPI Approved External Exams list. Prior approval of the assessment is required by emailing CDMquestions@wcpss.net. Many languages have prior approval through the WCPSS/Avant Storefront. Please note the following key details:

- Students are only permitted to test for CDM when they are presently at the middle school (8th grade) or high school grade level at their WCPSS school
- Students/families are responsible for registering, arranging the testing session, and funding any costs associated with the assessment
- · Students may earn up to 2 World Language credits
- . Depending on the language and language level, continued study in the language may not be available
- Score reports should be submitted to <u>CDMquestions@wcpss.net</u> for processing or notify <a href="mailto:CDMquestions@wcpss.net">CDMquestions@wcpss.net</a> if an Avant assessment was completed
- . Grades will be recorded as "CDM" (Credit by Demonstrated Mastery)
- . Grades and credits will not be included in the calculation of GPA nor class rank

# CDM - Eligible Courses

- Students must stay within the standard sequence of coursework in requesting CDM
- Students may pursue no more than three courses per year (and no more than one course in a sequence)
  - Example: A student currently enrolled in English I may request to CDM English II, but not English III because it is not the next course in the sequence.
- Per state policy, courses in the following subjects are ineligible for CDM
  - AP, IB, Healthful Living, some CTE courses, and other locally developed electives
- Study materials are not provided for CDM assessments



## CDM - Reasons to Pursue CDM

- Personal interest/deep understanding
- Ability to access higher levels of rigor
- Desire to experience new content, material, skills, beyond the scope of the traditional course
- Eligibility for early graduation

## **CDM - Considerations**

- May impact athletic eligibility
- Does not impact GPA/Class Rank
- Accelerated course may not be developmentally/emotionally appropriate
- May max-out of high school courses (especially in Math)
- Must still show increasing levels of rigor
  - o ex. student earned CDM in English I; HS does not offer many English electives
- May impact course options at certain schools
  - School may not have next-course options beyond NCVPS
  - School may only pair course with another (Honors English I/Honors World History)



# CDM - Considerations - ELA Example

# Considerations for accelerating in ELA

- Upper Level English Courses:
  - Include lengthy complex texts that may take more stamina to read
  - Include content that my be socially challenging
  - Use paired texts from authors with widely differing lenses and perspectives
  - Teach students to evaluate arguments from lenses and perspectives that may confront their own worldviews



# CDM - Considerations - ELA Example

# Thinking ahead to college applications

- Universities want to see:
  - 4 years of English Language Arts study
  - Increasing rigor in ELA over 4 years
- High School Course Plans:
  - College Board offers only 2 AP English courses
  - NC counts AP as a substitution for English III and English IV graduation requirement

# **Key Consideration**

If students take AP English courses early, what will they take to demonstrate increasing rigor in ELA for grades 11-12?



# CDM - Considerations - Math Example

# CDM in NC Math 1, 2, or 3

- Colleges/universities want to see math in all 4 years of high school and they want to see students challenging themselves by taking a combination of honors and AP courses
- There are a finite number of math courses that can be taken in high school
- With rapid acceleration, students may run out of available math courses
- Students should have a plan that includes math each year through their senior year



# CDM - Considerations - Biology Example

# **CDM** in Biology

 Allows students to access AP Biology and other AP Science courses earlier


## Caution
