

The Wave Interview: Jan Hargrove, OCE's First Principal

During a recent club meeting, we wondered what it was be like to be the very first principal of Olive Chapel Elementary. Lucky for us, Ms. Jan Hargrove, OCE's first principal, was willing to answer our questions.

What was it like being the first principal of a new school?

As a principal, opening Olive Chapel was a dream come true! It was a lot of work, but it was exciting at the same time. There were many meetings with the faculty and staff, students, parents and the greater Apex community to create a shared vision, select a mascot and PTA board to help us kick off the 1997-1998 school year.

How long were you the principal?

I was the principal from March 1997 (before the school opened officially) until February 2004, when I left to open Turner Creek Elementary. I was at OCE for almost seven years.

What inspired you to be a principal?

I always loved being a teacher and taught special education students for nine years. After teaching for several years, a mentor inspired me to go into school administration. I felt a calling to influence education in a different way. I wanted to have the best of both worlds working with students and working with the adults who served them in the classroom.

When you were the principal, how many staff and students were at OCE?

I like this question as it challenges my memory. We grew so much and so fast during my time at OCE. We opened the school with 500 students and ended the year with 650. The next year we ended with 1050 students. At one point, we had 120 staff members.

What's your favorite memory from being the principal here?

You have great questions! I have wonderful memories of my time at Olive Chapel. Art-a-Palooza holds a special place in my heart. This event was a celebration of the visual and performing arts along with a silent auction to support our school. We had international festivals, grade level plays and concerts as well.

I really enjoyed the April 1998 building dedication, too. We decided to wait until we had a little bit of history as a school community before we dedicated the building. Students created tiles during art class, which were installed down the main hallway.

Another activity I am proud of was our involvement in the KidsTowne/Kelly Road Park playground. We helped raise money for the playground by selling bricks and stock in the venue. This playground still exists today.

What kind of assemblies did you have?

Students experienced plays, musical events, writer in residence programs, puppet shows, African dance and drummer shows, and so much more. I imagine these are like what you have seen at Olive Chapel over the past few years. In addition, students participated in field trips to the Museum of Life and Science, Old Salem, and a Sound to Sea trip for 5th graders.

Was it hard being the principal and if so, did you ever want to give up?

It was a LOT of work to put together a new school. It meant many long days, weekend work, and nights away from my own children who were almost six and 10 at the time.

Over my career, there have been challenges and changes in education, but my underlying commitment to teaching and learning, mentoring others, and being part of a school community has never waivered. At times I have been tired, overwhelmed and discouraged, but once I step into a school, I find my energy from the teachers, students, staff, parents, colleagues and community to continue this important work.

The vision statement we created as a staff pushed all of us to ensure we were helping every child reach his/her greatest potential.

Dr. Steidinger. I never thought I would dress up in costumes so many times. Mrs. May was quite persuasive. We were Thing 1 and Thing 2, I believe a fried egg and bacon, PacMan costumes and on and on. I also really loved the Tik Tok dances Mr. Arce, Mrs. May and I created in the empty halls of OCE to inspire our families during Covid.

What the World Was Up to in 1997



All About Clippers

All of us at Olive Chapel are Clippers, but have you ever wondered exactly what a clipper is? You're about to find out!

A clipper can be any kind of ship, but it specifically means a ship designed to be fast. Some ships were designed to move people or transport goods, but clippers were made to move quickly through the water.

Most clipper ships were built in either the United States or in England in the 1800's. The front and back of clippers are sharp, which helps them with speed. Baltimore clippers were very famous and you can still see examples of them if you go to Baltimore Harbor in Maryland.

When the economy got bad, people didn't build clipper ships much anymore. The last clipper ship was built in 1873.
