If you have ever seen the kids outside with neon green vests, they are called Safety Patrol and they are here to make sure you get to and from class safely. Safety Patrol is made up of 5th graders and grouped by their tracks. Mrs. McCarty established the safety patrol around eight years ago and it's currently run by Ms. Chafee.

Safety Patrollers are stationed at both bus and carpool during morning arrival and afternoon dismissal. Safety Patrollers stationed at carpool help kids get into and out of their cars during morning arrival and afternoon dismissal. Those stationed at bus help the kids get to and from their buses in the morning and afternoon.

Safety patrol is also responsible for raising both the American and State of North Carolina flags in the morning. In the afternoon, they take them down and properly fold and store them.

At the end of the year, the 5th grade safety patrollers have the responsibility of training the 4th graders so that they are prepared to take over the next year.

What kind of things do you do in your job?

I am the only SLP at Olive Chapel. My job list is very long, but short and sweet: I help students improve their communication so that they can perform to the best of their ability in their classroom. I work with students across all levels who have difficulty with saying their speech sounds, stuttering, and language delays. In school speech therapy, we focus on how the student's difficulties impact their access to their classroom.

For example, a student struggling with saying correct speech sounds may not be understood correctly by their peers and teachers. This can cause them to not be able to fully participate.Another big part of my job is completing all the school's speech-language/communication testing.

Why did you want to be a speech-language pathologist?

I wanted to be a speech-language pathologist because I enjoy working with people! I also love the content of my field. I want to make a difference in people's lives by empowering them to develop their communication skills in ways that work the best for them. I chose to work in a school as a SLP due to my background as a teacher. Before becoming a SLP, I was a second-grade teacher for six years at a yearround school (Track 3!!)

Ms. Wiley also wanted to add that, "being a SLP means you need to be willing to be a lifelong learner. We need to be knowledgeable about such a variety of disorders, treatments, assessments, technology, etc. that it requires us to stay current on research and strategies that are proving to work. I enjoy learning new ways to provide therapy."

As you can see, May is very important. Ms. Wiley and all SLPs work so hard. I thought it was cool that Ms. Wiley even learns when she is an adult! That shows that you learn your whole life! Ms. Wiley works hard and loves her job, we are so lucky to have her here at OCE!
